

Vision



All pupils within the Trust will have the right to an outstanding education irrespective of social, economic or demographic factors.



Community Events & Fundraising

The school raised money through a variety of different events across the year. This year, money was raised for: Macmillan, Anchor House (a charity for the homeless in Canning Town), Jeans for Genes, MIND, British Heart Foundation, Sports Relief, Ambition, Achieve, Aspire (a community Project in Canning Town).

The school received funding from: a CIF bid for roofworks of £334,829; Bikeability of £8250 to support delivery of cycling sessions for students; music funding of £5000 to ensure years 4, 5 and 6 have music instrumental tuition by specialist teachers.

FINANCIAL OVERVIEW 2019-20


Finance Summary

In spite of the additional expenses relating to the COVID pandemic, the Trust ended the academic year 1st September 2019 to 31st August 2020 with cumulative reserves. In 2019-20, the Trust continued to spend money to ensure that buildings are fit for purpose, as well as additional spending to ensure our pupils, staff and visitors remained safe during the pandemic.



FUNDING/INCOME Funding for schools is predominantly received from the DfE/ESFA (Department for Education/ Employment and Skills Funding Agency) as restricted funds. Other funding is from the Local Authority, and the remaining income is a combination of smaller grants and trading income. The total received income in 2019/20 was £19,827,000; (£18,496,000 in 2018/19); of which ESFA income was £18,662,000 (£15,281,000 in 2018/19). The income breakdown is shown on the chart to the right:



EXPENDITURE The main activities of the schools is the provision of education and this is what the majority of expenditure was on. The largest part of the funding was spent on staff salaries (teachers' salaries - 65% and support staff salaries -10%). Other expenditure relates to technology, equipment, governance as well as fixed assets depreciation.



Average spend per pupil across the Trust in 2019/20 was £8,600.

COVID-related Expenditure

The Trust spent an additional £150,000 on ensuring schools continued to be safe environments for staff and pupils during the pandemic. This was used to purchase PPE, hand sanitisers, face masks, equipment such as pedal bins, as well as laptops for use by pupils and staff.

Finance during the COVID pandemic

The Trust had moved to a cloud-based finance system, and so was able to continue to work seamlessly during the lockdown period.

Building Works Grant

The Trust was successful in its grant funding application for works to improve two of the Trust's school buildings. The total award was £420,000 for roofing works in two of our schools.

HOW WE SUPPORTED OUR COMMUNITY DURING EXCEPTIONAL TIMES

In March 2020, the country went into lockdown in an effort to halt the spread of COVID-19. Whilst the Government advised everyone to work from home, school staff rightly took their place alongside other key workers to ensure that our schools remained open to those most in need.

As a Trust and group of schools, we all learned very quickly how to adapt to ensure that our children, parents and staff were supported during this worst of times.

This work continues....

Our schools were open to children of key workers and also our most vulnerable pupils throughout the Easter and Spring holidays, including bank holidays

25% of children in school within the London Borough of Newham during lockdown attended one of our four schools.

The Trust ensured **£150,000**

was made available to support schools for the purchase of:

- Home learning
- Chrome books
- Core textbooks
- Extra PPE and cleaning equipment

- Bereavement support
- Counselling and support offered to staff, parents and children

THE TRAINING HUB

The Tapscott Training Hub was created to meet the training needs of our staff and external partners in the London Borough of Newham and wider afield. The 2019-20 academic year has been challenging for all, but the Training Hub has adapted and developed to meet this ever changing environment. We have continued to offer and deliver professional development in our core areas, as well as improve, grow and progress many of our existing programmes. This has meant the Training Hub has continued to build upon its success in previous years.



External school improvement work through our National Leader of Education (NLE) and Subject Leader in Education (SLE) network has involved the Training Hub working further afield into areas such as North London and Ipswich. We have supported a number of staff in becoming newly appointed SLEs, in order to support the work we do as well as providing career progression and opportunities. This year has also seen our key facilitators receive high quality, accredited facilitator training from the Institute of Education (IOE), to support them in developing their training programmes as we continue our commitment to quality assurance.

Completion of major building works: Our Profound and Multiple Learning Disabilities (PMLD) provision was completed in the heart of the school; an embodiment of our ethos 'We All Belong'. The space includes three fully accessible classrooms, new disabled toilets, and therapy and sensory rooms. The school roof was also replaced, the corridors repainted and new carpets fitted.

'Buffy the Bus' was fully renovated and is a beautiful space for children to develop their love of reading.

The school choir sang at Christmas in the new BT studios in Stratford, singing alongside the choir from Curwen.

Secured significant funding from both the Variety Charity and The Baily Thomas Fund to support the creation of our new sensory room.

Funding from the Newham Enrichment Grants enabled the provision of group instrumental tuition to pupils in years 5 and 6.

A grant from TfL paid for three purpose-built bikes for pupils with Special Educational Needs, enabling them to learn to cycle alongside their classmates.

OUR PROVISION FOR CHILDREN WITH SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS

We are committed to meeting the special educational needs of pupils and ensuring that they make sustained progress and learn exceptionally well through our universal, targeted and specialised offer. Our schools are inclusive, and two of our schools have successful resource provisions.

This work covers a wide range, from children that require targeted support, to those that need a highly specialised programme. This support covers conditions such as speech and language, Autism, Dyslexia, Downs Syndrome and Cerebral Palsy, as well as many other special educational needs.

Our aim is to ensure that all children are given equal opportunities to achieve their full potential, by meeting their individual needs in a happy and secure environment.

Our schools hold a variety of inclusion quality marks and awards

We have been accredited by The Autism Education Trust to deliver its schools and early years programmes within Newham, which provide specialist training. This training is nationally recognised and supported by the Department of Education and the National Autistic Society.

Our lead for SEND, Helen Harris, received The Person National Teaching Silver Award for Excellence in Special Educational Needs in 2020. She is also an SLE, Specialist Leader in Education, for special educational needs.

PARTNERSHIP WORK

The Trust's Mission, Vision & Aims state clearly that we will 'work in partnership' between each Trust school, and also with other settings and organisations across the region. Trust staff members participate in a wide range of work with partner groups, including:

- School Improvement** – our CEO, a National Leader of Education, has supported other schools within Newham, other London Boroughs, and elsewhere in the South East of England with both school development and COVID support.
- Place 2Be** **Wellbeing** – membership of the DfE Expert Advisory Group, the Well Schools Movement, and one of 50 Change Makers promoting the borough's three year Health and Wellbeing Strategy.
- Well Schools** **Youth Sport Trust** – founding member of the Well Schools Movement.
- School Improvement** – our CEO, a National Leader of Education, has supported other schools within Newham, other London Boroughs, and elsewhere in the South East of England with both school development and COVID support.
- COVID-19 Specific Advice** – shared across the borough and with other Head Teachers discussing a range of subjects such as attendance and Health & Safety.
- Junior Citizens** – Schools Liaison Lead for Newham.
- RSHE** – the Trust was a leading partner within the RHSE (Religion, Sex & Health Education) Development Group that worked initially with schools across our local authority, but lately has provided training and advice across the whole region.
