Body parts should be named as early as possible and could be taught even younger than Year 2.	Continue to review at what stage we teach naming the body parts during year group welcome meetings.
It is important to teach about AI and how the world that we are living in is changing.	Embed proposed adaptations in the computing curriculum to explicitly teach what AI is and how to be a critical consumer and question the reliability of what is presented online.
Strong coverage of teaching the children to say “no” and being safe online.	
I am happy that you are teaching the children about growing up.	
I am glad gender stereotypes is taught, as it helps show empathy. I am happy for puberty to be taught starting in year 3, as children are experiencing this at a younger age.	Continue to teach puberty in Year 4 and review interest from parents/carers regarding children learning about the opposite sex during parent welcome meetings.
It would be helpful if boys are taught about the menstrual cycle in year 4, as they may hear things in the playground from their friends and have questions.	
I am happy with the curriculum – I think puberty should be taught from Year 4 as stated in the curriculum.
